1.0 Introduction

This course is meant to expose participants on the regulations imposed on ship owners and ship managers on the acquisition and operation of ships registered with the Malaysian government or operated in Malaysian waters. In addition, knowledge on the Law of the Sea is also imparted to students as it is imperative for those involved in ships operations to abide by the United Nations Law of the Sea Convention. Knowledge gained from this course will provide a good foundation for ships to be operated smoothly and safely and will prevent ship owners and operators that have taken due consideration of the legal requirements from any serious setbacks.

Upon completion of this course students should be able to:

1. Identify the national maritime legislation and authority with respect of shipping operation.

- 2. Explain the process of ship registration and licensing.
- 3. Examine the mandatory requirements for master's and seamen.

4. Evaluate the rights of coastal states and user states in the maritime zones.

5. Analyze whether a passage is innocent or otherwise.
